INSET DAY - Monday1st September 2014

Just to remind you that from September 2014 key stage 1 children (Reception, Year 1 and Year 2) will be entitled to a free school meal each day. They may continue to have a packed lunch provided by yourselves if they wish.

Key stage 2 children will still have to pay for their school meal unless they are entitled to a free school meal. (Speak to the office about eligibility)

From September 2014 school meals will be £1.85 per day for KS2.

Victoria Sponge Recipe

Ingredients

- 175g butter, soft
- 175g caster sugar
- 3 fresh eggs
- 175g self-raising flour
- 250ml double cream
- 1tsp vanilla bean paste, or vanilla extract
- 1tbsp icing sugar and extra for sifting
- 400g strawberries
- 4tbsp strawberry jam (optional)



Pre-heat the oven to 180°C. Butter and line two 18 cm sandwich tins with baking parchment. Beat the butter and the sugar till pale and fluffy. Add the eggs, one at a time, beating well. Fold in the flour, one spoon at a time.

Divide the mixture evenly between the tins and level with a knife. Bake in the oven for 20 minutes until the sponge cakes are well risen, golden brown and firm to the touch.

Cool the sponge cakes on a wire rack. Hull the strawberries and slice them in half. Whip the cream till quite stiff, mix in the icing sugar and the vanilla.

When the cakes are cool, spread the jam on one of the sponge cakes (if using) and spread half of the whipped cream on top. Place half of the strawberries on top of the cream. Place the other sponge cake on top and spread with the remaining whipped cream. Arrange the remaining strawberries in a spiral round the cake.

Year Two



This term **2AW** have embraced the new topic of 'The Great Outdoors'. Children in our class have shown a keen interest in animals, therefore we have focused learning on this area and have built on their curiosity by exploring a range of creatures. 2AW have enjoyed researching to discover new information and facts. In literacy each child has used their information to write a page on their favourite minibeast or animal, which has been included in a class book called 'Creatures Great

and Small'. We have been inquisitive scientists this term, making food chains, sorting creatures into different classes and deciding whether animals are carnivores, omnivores or herbivores. 2AW have also discussed adaptations animals have to protect themselves against predators and discovered different habitats. Children have learnt about the 7 different continents and where different animals come from in geography. In Art 2AW have created some amazing camouflage butterfly pictures.



In **2W** the children have been 'Following in the footsteps of Charles Darwin'. Identifying the trees and flowers in the school grounds, creating bar charts of 'The Location of Daisies', pressing flowers for displays and growing plants from seeds to discover how they grow. We had a successful pond dip and found lots of Common Newts, snails and water boatman. We have also been outside observing the trees and making picture frames from sticks and practising our whittling skills. This all lead to our assembly which was held in the Outdoor Classroom.







Fill in the grid with numbers 1 to 9 making sure no number is repeated in every row, every column and within each mini grid.



Well Done 4C!


4C produced a fantastic assembly based around the book 'Leon and the Place Between'. We enjoyed exploring this beautiful book as part of our Fairgrounds topic.
