












Reception

We then wrote our own Naughty Bus stories and had lots of fun with the baked beans in our black trays!










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Journalism Club

Mill on the Brue was very fun but very annoying. People were very scared but they pushed their limit and went for it.



sea with a loud plop. Then the volcano was asleep once again.


Maths.

Tyntesfield is a Victorian Gothic Revival house and estate near Wraxall, North Somerset, England. The house is a Grade I listed building named after the Tynte baronets, who had owned estates in the area since about 1500.










Rock Circus
